Unpredictable rain

Dark clouds hang above Kitui, signalling the advent of the wet season. Yet the rain doesn't fall. And so it has been for the past three rainy seasons in eastern and northern Kenya, where drought has been declared a national disaster. Local families live in desperation. Catherine and her three children are no exception.

"Rain used to be predictable," says Catherine. "It rained constantly, and I knew when to plant and harvest."

As a single mother, Catherine collects and sells firewood to provide for her children. She also farms millet, cowpeas and mung beans every year, but the prolonged drought and a devastating locust invasion in 2021 have destroyed her crops. That's when the local church stepped in.

Stella, Catherine's 8-year-old daughter, is sponsored through Compassion. This support helps the local church to deliver extra food baskets to the family as the drought continues.

"The food we received from the church came as a relief," says Catherine. "I had been considering leaving my mother with the children so I could look for work elsewhere."

With support from her church, Catherine can focus on paying school fees, knowing there is food at home for her children. Benedict, a local worker at Stella's Compassion centre, knows that the biggest need of food insecure families is water.

"The land is fertile, but without water, food cannot grow," says Benedict. "As a church, we're working to educate parents on new agricultural practices and more sustainable methods of food production without relying on rain."



How is Compassion responding?
